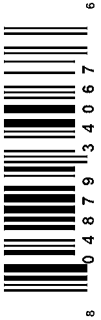

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County Makes Important Donation for Veterans

The recently released movie *American Sniper* has launched a conversation in this country on the treatment of our veterans once they returned from combat activities. This includes veterans from WW II, Vietnam, etc. It's a conversation that is overdue when you see the effects of soldiers suffering from PTSD and other injuries, some seen, some unseen.

In December, the Board of Supervisors unanimously voted to sell (donate) our unused Discovery Class RV Conversion vehicle to Hiring and Helping Our Heroes of Pinal County Incorporated for one dollar.

The RV had been purchased by the county in 2007 for use in the Maricopa area as a mobile public health clinic. We received a grant from the Gila River Indian Community to purchase the vehicle. In 2012, the county opened a permanent health clinic in Maricopa making the RV obsolete.

Since that time the RV sat unused in our fleet yard.

Conversations between our Public Health Director and the Director of "Hiring and Helping Our Heroes of Pinal County" led to this donation.

There are approximately 38,000 to 40,000 veterans in our county. During the winter months, that number increases dramatically when the winter visitors arrive. There is only one Veteran's Administration office for the county located in Casa Grande. That means a lot of our Veterans have a

long drive to receive the services they earned.

The good people at "Hiring and Helping Our Heroes of Pinal County" have high hopes for the services this RV can bring to our Veterans throughout the entire county. The RV is to bring such services as medical and mental healthcare, offer access to a Veteran's Administration representative along with bringing a navigator to help users access a variety of services.

I am pleased that we were able to help this dedicated group of volunteers looking to give our Veterans that extra help they need. One thing I did ask - is that when they repaint, or cover the van to their logo and colors, to please put on there that this is a gift from the people of Pinal County and Gila River Indian Community. I hope that you will be as

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Pinal County Should Not Subsidize the Federal Government

Subsidizing the federal government. Not exactly the words everyone wants to hear. There has been a lot of speculation on why the Supervisors cancelled the contract with with Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE).

Pinal County had the contract with (ICE) to house their detainees. In short, we were losing millions on an agreement that was signed in 2006. In a prudent move, the Board directed our Internal Audit to look at the contract to see what the true numbers were when it came to what we

were receiving from ICE. Following that audit along with an independent audit, it was determined the taxpayers were actually subsidizing the federal government to the tune of \$3.5 million a year. In 2013, the Sheriff even created a contract coordinator position to oversee negotiations from the Sheriff's side. I personally supported the creation of this position because it showed that the Sheriff was also very concerned about the loss of taxpayer money. A memo from that office to ICE admits the department was losing around \$2 million a year. Looking at the costs of running the detention center, in fiscal year 2011/12 the per diem rate recommended from the study conducted by MGT, the break-even point to house ICE detainees was determined to be in the area of \$13.7 million. Instead we were bringing in only \$9.6 million due to a per diem rate set in 2006. That is quite a loss to the county general fund. Fact, we were losing money and the Board of Supervisors stepped up and

took the necessary action to remedy a bad financial deal. It is terribly unfortunate to have to lay off 43 employees in January. I have worked among those people and I feel for their situation. It's time to stop playing politics when it comes to the taxpayer's money.

Tribal member speaks out against land exchange

My name is Tina Mull. I am the granddaughter of Marvin Mull, Sr., our former Tribal Chairman and my father is Marvin Mull, Jr., our former Vice Chairman of the San Carlos Apache Tribe. As a youth, I remember my late grandfather who always talked to us about standing up for our Apache People and protecting what belongs to us Apaches. That includes our water, our land, our natural resources and our identity as being Apaches. This is why I am speaking out against what is happening to us as Apaches and many of you don't know the real story. The Southeast Arizona Land Exchange Bill that was passed last December, 2014, sabotages one of the most important and basic environmental and cultural protection laws in the U.S., which is the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA). Under NEPA law, the public would have been able to comment and obtain information from the USFS about the significant environmental, cultural and human right impacts and harms caused by this mine. Exempting the mine's structure and plan of operation from NEPA is like taking away the Magna Carta or being exempt from the U.S. Constitution or taking away the Bill of Rights. The USFS should be required by federal law to describe all of the potential impacts and harms of this mine to the land, water and air pollution and human and cultural and historical harms in the

so-called Environmental Impact Statement (EIS). Where is the review of what efforts the mining company will have to make to protect the priceless cultural, historical, Native American, riparian, recreational and environmental values at stake here? BHP and Rio Tinto, who are foreign mining companies have horrendous environmental and human rights records at their third world mine sites, but, also at their U.S. and other non-third world mining properties. Oak Flat was protected by President Dwight Eisenhower, and, later, reaffirmed by President Richard Nixon. And, along came Senator John McCain, who ran for the U.S. Presidency and lost the election! In return, he helps these two foreign mining companies, who associate with Iran and Iraq, to build a mine on U.S. soil on land holy and sacred to our Apaches! Now, who will monitor the mine when they dewater and destroy the critical groundwater aquifer vital to maintaining plant and animal life of the priceless Ga'an Canyon riparian wetlands and culturally significant area? 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Oracle man killed in rollover accident on Cody Loop

On Saturday, Feb. 14, 2015 at approximately 2:09 a.m., the Pinal County Sheriff's Office received a report of an accident with injuries on Cody Loop Rd. in Oracle. Upon arrival at the scene, deputies found two subjects standing to the east of Cody Loop Rd. and a white Toyota pickup truck with its wheels in the air, down an embankment with heavy damage on both sides and top.

The two individuals, a witness and the driver of the Toyota, later identified as Tyler Egan, 27, Oracle, stated there was another individual still inside of the truck. The passenger, later identified as Michael Henderson, 34, Oracle, was non-responsive when deputies arrived.

Due to the vehicle being upside-down, Henderson could not be extricated until fire and rescue crews arrived.

Egan was transported to University Medical Center for a medical evaluation of any potential injuries.

According to the Pinal County Sheriff's Office, crews worked to extricate Henderson from the truck but a unit on scene pronounced him deceased at 3:36 a.m.

Investigation of the accident remains on-going, but deputies on scene believe alcohol may be a factor.

Rough section of SR 77 to be smoothed by ADOT, Rios says

MAMMOTH – Pinal County Board of Supervisor's Vice Chairman Pete Rios is pleased to announce that the Arizona Department of Transportation (ADOT) will begin a maintenance/repair project on a section of State Route 77 north of Mammoth.

"I have been working in conjunction with Senator Barbara McGuire's office to find a solution to a rough section of State Route 77 between mile posts 116 and 120," the Vice Chairman said. "Earlier this week Senator McGuire reported that ADOT will be working on that section of the road beginning on March 4. This has been an issue I have been concerned about for the past year."

According to ADOT, they will be carrying out a project to remove the friction coarse from Wednesday, March 4 until Thursday, March 5. They will then fog coat the roadway to seal it and come back a couple of months after to perform a crack seal. In the fall, they anticipate chip sealing the roadway to finish off.

"What I understand is that the friction course placed on the road is raveling and creating ruts for drivers on the highway," Rios said. "ADOT will be removing it and completing the work to make the road smoother and safer. My thanks to Senator McGuire and ADOT for helping to make this happen."

Currently, ADOT has a pavement preservation project scheduled from mileposts 113 to 120.4 on State Route 77 for 2018. This starts in Mammoth and goes north.

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Oracle Piano Society plans concert, Skunk Storytime for kids

On Sunday, March 1, 3 p.m., join The Oracle Piano Society for Picturing Ravel: Gaspard de la Nuit, A Musical Soliloquy at SaddleBrooke II, 39900 S. Clubhouse Dr. in Tucson.

Gaspard de la Nuit, the book originally penned by Aloysius Bertrand - or, according to Mr. Bertrand's introduction, coming from the devil - is a collection of gothic poetry and over 70 tableaux depicting angels, fairies, ghouls and goblins in a medieval setting. It is world famous and has inspired artwork of varying sorts, including Ravel's compositions of the same title which contains three scenes of fantasy and the macabre selected from the book.

Have you read the poems? Here is a small sampling from Ondine. " Each wave is a water sprite who swims in the stream, each stream is a footpath that winds towards my palace, and my palace is a fluid structure, at the bottom of the lake, in a triangle of fire, of earth and of air."

Of Gaspard de la Nuit, Maurice Ravel said: "Gaspard has been a devil in coming, but that is only logical since it was he who is the author of the poems. My ambition is to say with notes what a poet expresses with words." As Ravel also intended, the Scarbo movement has made the piece famous for its technical difficulty and profound construction, and, certainly, more difficult than anything composed by Balakirev.

The word Gaspard is taken from the Persian and means "the man who guards the royal treasures". The name Gaspard de Nuit, as a whole, alludes to that which is dark, mysterious, and, precious; many translate the title as "Sorcerer of the Night". Any way you translate it, it is a fitting name for a piece that is so difficult that it has driven some pianists mad with frustration. It is called the most difficult piano work ever written, requiring "wrists of steel, fingers with eyes in them." It is a work of transcendent virtuosity and stunning imagination, and, it is the focal point of this March 1 concert featuring The Oracle Piano Society's own founder and Artistic Director, Dr. Stephen Cook.

Keeping in line with the Oracle Piano's Society's mission to promote artistic fusion, Cook will punctuate his piano performances with silent film footage and recitations of Bertrand's poetry. Also on program: Ravel's Sonatine accompanied by Cook's own selections from Bertrand's writings. Tickets can be purchased online at <http://tickets.saddlebrooketwo.com>. The Oracle School District is very excited to bring the music program back for the 2015-16 school year.

It has been two years since Oracle students have been able to experience the benefits that come with a quality music program. Music programs are not only invaluable to a student's overall educational success, they also provide opportunities for students to perform, where they often discover hidden talents that contribute to their personal growth and self-confidence.

There is overwhelming proof that having music as part of the curriculum will benefit the Oracle School District students in ways that reach far beyond the music classroom. A comprehensive study conducted by the Education and the Arts Project Report (REAP) showed that there are significant, reliable causal relationships between the systematic, formal study of music and gains in mathematics and in spatial-

temporal relationships. Brain studies show the development of more extensive neural connections in musicians.

How was the District able to bring the program back? Careful fiscal management, a progressive School Board and strong District wide community support of the recent budget override are the primary contributing factors that make it possible for the District to take this huge step forward. One obstacle to establishing a top notch music program has been not having a dedicated music classroom. A creative solution to this dilemma is the District's decision to convert a long unused locker room into a first rate music classroom. The great thing about this renovation is that the new music room will actually be connected to the building where the students will perform.

Because the District has had a music program in the past, there are music teaching materials and instruments to help get the program started. Thanks to the support of a core of strong volunteers like the Mountain Vista Music Boosters, the sky is the limit for the new program. The District would very much like the program to eventually teach band instruments

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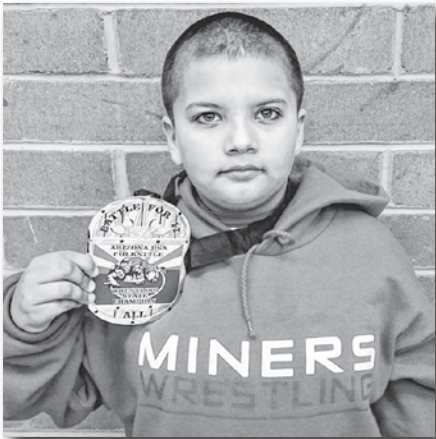
Four local young wrestlers win state championships

Town of Mammoth operating at a loss, owes more HURF funds

The Town of Mammoth’s new leadership has wasted little time since taking control in November to discover just how bad the town’s finances are. The town has now been audited through the fiscal year of 2012 and it is indeed a grim picture.

At the last Mammoth Town Council meeting, a presentation was given by Scott Graf of the Colby and Powell accounting firm. Graf spoke on the audit of the town’s finances for the fiscal year 2011-2012. The audit showed that the amount of HURF funds that the Town of Mammoth must pay back is now \$909,278. It appears that the Town of Mammoth has been spending more than it takes in and was using the HURF funds to make up their budget shortfalls.

The audit showed that Mammoth has been operating at a loss with water, sewer, sanitation and cemetery operations for years. The General Fund suffered a loss of \$170,424 in 2011 and \$187,388 in 2012. The town has been borrowing from the HURF funds since 2005.

There are two more audits to be done for fiscal years 2012-2013 and 2013-2014. It is not known yet if during these periods the Town of Mammoth began paying back the HURF funds or continued to borrow more or if the town continued to spend more than the revenue they were bringing in. The new mayor and council will have some hard budget decisions to make in the near future.
